NEW BREMEN SCHOOL 1% INCOME TAX RENEWAL

On May 6, 2014, the New Bremen Schools will ask voters of the district to renew the 1% School District Income Tax for a continuing period of time. This will continue the existing income tax levy, which expires on December 31, 2014. Making it a continuing levy will save us legal and election fees and allow us to more confidently plan for our children's future.


Over the last ten years, these dollars have been used to fund the general operation of the district. The renewal is not asking for any new taxes, it simply continues what we have currently.

New Bremen Schools is a service organization, so personnel costs account for the vast majority of our expenses at 78%. Since the last renewal in 2009, we have made some reductions in overall personnel costs by reducing our teaching staff by 2.8 individuals and reducing staff hours of custodial workers, cafeteria workers, and library aides. We are looking at further reductions of a library aide and reducing two full-time teaching positions to part-time teaching positions during the 2014-15 school year.

The school district income tax is a substantial percentage of our total revenue and the uncertain future of the state funding has made these funds even more critical. As we strive to operate as efficiently as possible, we will continue to provide an excellent education to our students. In order to accomplish this, we need your support on the renewal of the 1% school district income tax levy. How your 1% Income Tax is being used:

- 11 Full Time Teachers and 1 Part Time Teacher
- 1 Full Time and 1 Part Time Custodians/ Maintenance employees
- 1 Secretary
- 1 day a week for a Nurse
- 1 Full Time Study Hall/Library/Cafeteria Aide
- 1 Full Time plus 1 day a week Bus Driver
- 1 Administrator
- 70% of our utilities and maintenance of the buildings
- \$48,000 toward supplies (nursing, office, custodial, guidance, elementary, high school, textbooks, library periodicals)
- \$34,000 toward equipment purchases (computers, classroom equipment, custodial and maintenance equipment, library books)
- \$21,000 to pay for 20% of insurances and county/state fees

The 1% income tax covers 20% of our expenses. State and federal monies, real estate taxes, etc. cover the remaining 80% of our expenses. As you can see by the list above, educational services to our students would suffer greatly if this income tax is not renewed.

ASBESTOS HAZARD EMERGENCY RESPONSE ACTS (AHERA)



In accordance with the requirements of the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act which was passed by Congress in 1986, this article serves as notification of the availability of a Management Plan designed to alleviate the presence of asbestos hazards from present school buildings.

The Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) requires schools to be inspected to identify any asbestoscontaining building materials. Suspected asbestoscontaining building materials were located, sampled (or assumed), and rated according to condition and potential hazard. Every three years, New Bremen Local Schools has conducted a reinspection to determine whether the condition of the known or assumed asbestos-containing building material (ACBM) changed and to recommendations on managing or removing the ACBM. At the last inspection conducted on October 26, 2012, all materials listed in the Management Plan as asbestoscontaining (or assumed to be asbestos-containing) were inspected.

New Bremen Local Schools have developed a management plan, as required, which has been continually updated. The plan has several ongoing requirements:

- Publish a notification on management plan availability and the status of asbestos activities
- Educate and train its employees about asbestos and how to deal with it
- Notify short-term or temporary workers on the locations of the asbestos-containing building materials
- Post warning labels in routine maintenance areas where asbestos was previously identified or assumed
- Follow set plans and procedures designed to minimize the disturbance of asbestos-containing building materials
- Survey the condition of these materials every six months to assure that they remain in good condition

It is the intention of New Bremen Local Schools to comply with all federal and state regulations controlling asbestos and to take whatever steps are necessary to ensure students and employees a healthy and safe environment in which to learn and work. A copy of the district's Management Plan is available for review during normal office hours in the office of the Superintendent.

K-4 PRINCIPAL'S REPORT




KINDERGARTEN NEWS



SIXTH GRADE NEWS

We are also taking a field Social Studies test on March 26, as preparation for implementing state testing in Science. In Math and Science our students have been busy working on their brand new Gizmos on our iPads, which are a great interactive tool for learning difficult concepts. This hands-on experience will help our students not only with the OAA but also with the new age of digital testing (PARCC).

Speaking of the PARCC testing, our school is piloting a Reading and Math practice section this spring, which our sixth graders will be taking on the computers in April. We will not be receiving results from these tests since they are used to norm the test when it eventually becomes implemented. We are excited about the opportunity to get a glimpse of how our students will be expected to perform and how they will be tested in the future.

Parents please note that due to many days missed because of inclement weather, state testing is moved a week later-Reading OAA is now April 29 and Math OAA is May 1st!

It has become apparent, that despite the many changes that occur within the scope of education today, that our staff and students show-up prepared to do the work necessary to learn and show growth despite things that are out of our control. This continued grit and perseverance will serve our students well whatever path they choose to pursue in life after high school.

Since many of our students from New Bremen go on to college, it is important to note what those institutions look for. All colleges are not the same, but most view students grades looking at consistency or improvement over time. They look at ACT/SAT scores to get a comparison to other students nationally, then they look at class rank to determine a comparison to other students locally and, finally, other factors like entrance exams/essays, extra-curricular involvement, recommendations from faculty, and any job related experience showing a commitment to a work ethic.

Looking to the end of this school year, there is much to be completed. For seniors, it's counting down the days left and fulfilling graduation requirements. For the remaining students, it's a taste of things to come in terms of assessments and future accountability measures that will see them to their graduation day. We also have recently completed our Second Annual Senior Seminar and will have our Second Annual Talent Show scheduled for Prom Week. One thing this year's group is intending to revitalize is some form of field day which will be planned for May. Let's just hope that by then the weather is more cooperative than it was this past winter.

HIGH SCHOOL SCIENCE

The students at New Bremen High School will have the opportunity to take a new science class starting next school year. The current environmental science class is going away and an Advanced Placement Biology will take its place. All core departments here at NBHS currently offer at least one AP course, except science, so we thought that it was time to get on board. This class will be available to students who have already completed Biology and Chemistry. At the end of the course, the students will have the option to take the AP exam where they can earn college credit if they score high enough. Below I have included a portion of my description of the class from the course description book.

This course will provide students with a learning experience equivalent to that of a college course in introductory Biology. Students will focus on the conceptual understanding of different topics in Biology and the content that supports these concepts. Students will spend less time with factual recall and more time on inquiry-based learning. The course is centered around four "Big Ideas."

- 1. The process of evolution drives the diversity and unity of life
- 2. Biological systems utilize free energy and molecular building blocks to grow, to reproduce, and to maintain dynamic homeostasis
- 3. Living systems store, receive, transmit, and respond to information essential to life processes
- 4. Biological systems interact, and these systems and their interactions possess complex properties

The AP Biology class will be very rigorous and students are going to have to work hard, but I am confident in our students and know they will do great. It is my first year teaching the class so I am sure there will be some growing pains, but we will all dive in and be in it together.

FAMILY CONSUMER SCIENCE NEWS

On January 17, 2014 the Auglaize County Ohio State University Extension Office came to New Bremen High School and helped us complete our unit on financial literacy by conducting the Real Money, Real World hands-on activity. Forty-four students, freshmen through seniors, participated in the activity where they were able to have a salary and then use that salary to provide for their family. They had to provide items for their family such as shelter, clothing, food, transportation, child care, utilities and insurance. New to the Real Money, Real World activity this year was the college loan aspect. If a student went to college, they had to factor in their monthly loan payments on top of the other expenses. This was an eye opener for many college bound students. I would like to thank the Auglaize County OSU Extension Office and all of the community volunteers that took time out of their day to come in and make this activity happen for our students.







ATHLETIC PHYSICALS FOR THE SCHOOL YEAR 2014-2015

Dear Parents and Future Athletes.

It is that time of year again to begin preparing for the Athletic Physicals for the 2014-2015 school year.

All students wishing to partake in any sports activity for the 2014-2015 school year must have a completed physical form on file. All physicals must be completed after May 1, 2014 to count for the next school year.

Physical preliminaries will be done on the following dates:

March/April - 6th, 7th, and 8th grades -

in nurse's office

Tuesday, April 15th - 9th, 10th, and 11th grades -

in H.S. Gym

Preliminary physicals consist of height, weight, blood pressure, and pulse. Forms will be available for any student using an inhaler or Epi-Pen. These will need to be filled out by the Dr. at their physical appointment. Also, urine specimen cups will be distributed during the preliminary physicals.

Upon completion of the preliminary physicals, it is important for parents to call and get an appointment scheduled as soon as possible for after May 1, 2014. Students will have the option of scheduling an appointment with their own private physicians, or, once again Southland Family Medicine, Drs. Luedeke, Roode, and Stegall will be offering physicals from May 1, 2014 thru May 21, 2014. They will also be offering a couple evenings for appointments this year to try to accommodate the students' busy schedules. The cost at Southland Family Medicine will be \$20.00. Be sure to call early as the appointments fill quickly.

For their physicals, students need to bring with them:

- Their physical forms, which must be completed with their name, address, history and signed by both the student and parent.
- 2. Any Asthma inhaler or Epi-Pen forms needing to be completed.
- The urine specimen, labeled with the student's name on it.

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
