K-4 PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

New Bremen Elementary has had a great start to the 2014-2015 school year! We are excited to welcome the following new staff members to the elementary: Lindsay Roiberg - second grade, Chad Wells - elementary computers, Holly Smith - elementary music, Becky Eyink - elementary secretary, and Shelley This has come to the elementary from the high school as our elementary media specialist. They are all extremely dedicated professionals and have jumped aboard our elementary team.

This year we are revamping our character education program for students in grades K-4. Lauren Link, our school psychologist/ guidance counselor, and I have combined our Cardinal Way initiative with a "Word of the Month" theme. Students will learn about and share with others how to exemplify the specific word of the month. Students will expand on the specific words during guidance lessons, computer class, and in the regular classroom. A special thank you goes out to Bolly's Restaurant for furnishing pizza each month to the students who best model the "Word of the Month" through their words and actions.

During the months of September and October, many students will be involved in testing in the elementary grades. Kindergarten students participate in the KRA (Kindergarten Readiness Assessment) evaluation in September. This is a state evaluation tool that determines students' readiness for the kindergarten curriculum. Students in grades 1-3 were assessed using the State reading diagnostic assessment. This assessment is given as a requirement of The Third Grade Reading Guarantee. These results assist us knowing if students are on track to be reading on grade level by the end of the year. These results also help us determine our intervention needs. Our third grade students will be participating in the Ohio Reading Achievement Assessment on Tuesday, October 7th. This test will also be administered in the spring for students who do not pass in the fall. Second and fourth grade students will be taking the Stanford Achievement Test and the OLSAT cognitive test during the beginning of October. These assessments assist us with identifying students for gifted services.

The group will meet several times a month to plan school-based activities and participate in leadership development activities.

Character Education

The New Bremen School District is focusing on character development this school year. Students in grades 5-8 frequently struggle with the transition in their personal development between late childhood and adolescence. It is a stage when students want to establish independence, but may lack some of the social and emotional skills indicating they are capable of handling the responsibility. As a result, we have added several new programs and activities at the middle school to help prompt students to reflect on character development and look ahead to career planning. Every student in grades 5-8 will be developing basic life goals, learn about establishing good habits, and exploring potential career interests.

Students will also be exposed to several forms of written publications and public speaking to help aide in the development of selfconfidence and the importance of professionalism. Students in grade 5-8 have the opportunity to be a part of the Newspaper Club. The Newspaper Club will be highlighting school-based events in a monthly publication starting in October. Every seventh grade student will be responsible for reading the building announcements each morning for a period of one week. The morning announcements are audio broadcasts over the school's intercom system. Eighth grade students will be taking part in weekly video reviews as a part of the eighth grade technology class. The videos will be recorded and posted on the school's YouTube Channel, which may be found on the school website.

These are just a few of the many activities planned for this school year. We hope that each experience our students are exposed to and participate in will have an impact on their personal development. Please feel free to contact the middle school if you have any questions.

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EIGHTH GRADE LANGUAGE ARTS

This year in eighth grade Language Arts, we will be working diligently on improving as writers. It is my intention this year that we will be able to incorporate not only regular writing exercises, but also grammar instruction and literature study as a means of achieving this goal. Already students have been making great efforts and have started working with several different methods to help them develop as writers. We are using the Writer's Notebook and independent novel studies.

At the beginning of the year, each student set up a Writer's Notebook. This is a space where students write regularly, gather ideas for writing topics, edit and revise, and compile lists for inspiration. Several times a week we work with the Writer's Notebook in class, sometimes freewriting, other times revisiting previous writing samples and improving them, and still others practicing skills and techniques we have studied in class. The Writer's Notebook also provides a place for grammar instruction to be applied in more of a real life context; rather than containing grammar study to worksheets and quizzes, students use grammatical structures to add spice and interest to their writing and use mechanics and usage principles to polish pieces. This encourages students to think about grammar as an integral part of improving writing, much as they will need to do when writing in the real world.

Besides practicing writing, one of the greatest ways to improve as a writer is reading. Published writing is full of interesting words, intriguing phrases, and whole passages that wow readers. Published writing is full of techniques worth imitating. That is the goal. Through the independent novel studies, students are encouraged not only to enjoy stories they have chosen to read, but also to stop and appreciate the beauty of language. Once they have collected snippets of text that excite them, they can work on analyzing what the writer did and incorporate the same techniques into their own writing.

Implementing these methods has been an interesting adventure so far, and I am excited to see how far students will have come in their writing by the end of the year!

SEVENTH AND EIGHTH GRADE SCIENCE

We are off to a great start in seventh and eighth grade science class for the 2014-2015 school year. Students are giving great effort each day, working together, and helping each other out along the way. There are many aquariums set up around the classroom with organisms such as reptiles, amphibians, fish, insects, arachnids, and crustaceans which enable students to observe living organisms daily.

In each quarter, our focus will be on the different areas of our state standards.


If the first few weeks are any indication of what is to come, the 2014-2015 school year in the science class room will prove to be a great one!

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Back to School: Safety Tips for Motorists

Sharing the Road Safely with School Buses

School buses are one of the safest forms of transportation on the road today. In fact, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, riding a bus to school is 13 times safer than riding in a passenger vehicle and 10 times safer than walking to school. The reality of school bus safety is that more children are hurt outside the bus than inside as passengers. Most of the children who lose their lives in bus-related crashes are pedestrians, four to seven years old, who are hit by the bus or by motorists illegally passing a stopped school bus. For this reason, it is necessary to know the proper laws and procedures for sharing the road safely with school buses:

- All 50 states have a law making it illegal to pass a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children.
- School buses use yellow flashing lights to alert motorists that they are preparing to stop to load or unload children. Red flashing lights and an extended stop sign arm signals to motorists that the bus is stopped and children are getting on or off the bus.
- All 50 states require that traffic in both dirrections stop on undivided roadways when students are entering or exiting a school bus.
- While state laws vary on what is required on a divided roadway, in all cases, traffic behind the school bus (traveling in the same direction) must stop.
- The area 10 feet around a school bus is where children are in the most danger of being hit. Stop your car far enough from the bus to allow children the necessary space to safely enter and exit the bus.
- Be alert. Children are unpredictable. Children walking to or from their bus are usually very comfortable with their surroundings. This makes them more likely to take risks, ignore hazards, or fail to look both ways when crossing the street.
- Never pass a school bus on the right. It is illegal and could have tragic consequences.



NEW GRADUATION REQUIREMENTAND STATE TESTING REQUIREMENTS FOR THE CLASS OF 2018 AND BEYOND

Over the summer, new graduation requirements for the Class of 2018 and beyond were developed. As with other education initiatives, we anticipate that these requirements may change during a legislative meeting scheduled in the next month, but for now, we have to focus on these new requirements. A detailed explanation of these requirements can be found in the document below. In lieu of these requirements, we will be implementing performance-based assessments and end of year exams this year on the following dates for the subjects mentioned, as well.

New High School Graduation Requirements Beginning with the Class of 2018

New

House Bill 487 updated Ohio's graduation requirements to ensure that all students are ready for success in college and work. As a result, the Class of 2017 (10th-graders in the 2014-2015 school year) will be the last students to take the current Ohio Graduation Tests. The new requirements take effect with students entering ninth grade in the 2014-2015 school year (Class of 2018). Additionally, every student in the Class of 2018 and beyond will have the opportunity to take a nationally-recognized college admission exam free of charge in Grade 11. The honors diploma remains another option for students.

Science units multi-indude one unit of physical sciences, one unit of life sciences and one unit advanced study in one or more of the following sciences, chemistry, physics or other physical science, advanced biology or other life accence; astronomy, physical geology or other earth or space science. Students on a Student Success Plan may be exempted from advanced study in science.

*Social studies units must include 12 unit of American history and 12 unit of American government,

¹Electives units must include one or any combination of foreign language, fine arts, business, career-technical education, family and consumer sciences, technology, agricultural education or English language arts, mathematics, science or social studies courses not otherwise required.

'All students must receive instruction in economics and financial literacy during Grades 9-12 and must complete at least two semesters of fine arts taken any time in Grades 7-12. Students following a career-technical pathway are exempted from the fine arts requirement.

The State Board of Education may decide to include an algebra II end-of course examination in place of the algebra Lend of course exam beginning for students entering much grade on or after July 1, 2016.

HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

I am starting a student leadership group to further develop our current and future leaders based upon positions they have attained here at the high school. All students are getting additional time focused on relationships, grit, and leadership throughout the day and in Cardinal Time via our new Cardinal Way Campaign. We will also have continued work in these areas through speakers, lessons, and activities throughout the year.

As we enter the 2014-15 school year, we have a few updated discipline policies that will affect students. Due to the misuse of cell phones last year, we have decided students can only view their phones over their lunch period, keeping their phone in their locker the remainder of the day. The only exception to this would be if a teacher requests that the class bring their phone with them the following day in order for an educationally related purpose in class. Students should not be viewing their phones in the hallways, restrooms, nor in classes unless specified. In case of emergencies the office is where a student should go to place a call or in extreme cases the teacher will have their cell phone in their room if needed. If a phone is used outside of these specific directions by a student it will be kept in the high school office until after school when it can be picked up and accountability assigned.

Another area of concern is students bringing in every kind of drink with them including 2-liters of pop, cappuccinos, and energy drinks. Besides the fact that they spill them and create a clean-up mess, the unhealthy habit of starting their day with an influx of sugar and caffeine has outcomes that affect their body throughout the remainder of the day in detrimental ways. We would ask that students only bring water and drink it out of a clear container. If they wish, we also have excellent drinking water at several fountains placed throughout the school for them to utilize.

A detailed explanation on how to calculate a grade point average and examples of how Advanced Placement courses will be calculated was given to all sophomores and juniors at the end of last year as it could affect scheduling priorities for them this year. We have met with all incoming students at the start of this year to deliver the same information to them so that all students are informed. This scale was approved at the May Board of Education meeting and development of this new scale was completed by a committee of staff members after much research and debate with the impetus being a more rigorous curriculum that is now in place and room for students to show their progress within the new scale. Additionally, there will be a retroactive application of this scale for students who took Algebra 1 in the eighth grade and AP Government as juniors last year so that the scale is used equally among all current high school students.

Finally, I want to thank all the booster organizations here at school for the many fundraisers, activities, and support they offer various programs here at NBHS. It is great to see how their involvement helps our students.

READING FOR INCREASED RIGOR

High school English students at every grade level will read a variety of classics, contemporary novels, plays, and nonfiction texts. Mrs. Newbright, Mrs. Schumm, and Mrs. Luebke have developed the following reading lists at the various grade levels in a way that will increase the level of text complexity, emphasize critical thinking skills, and expand students' ability to provide thoughtful analysis of texts. Students' reading lists includes:

Freshmen: Speak, To Kill a Mockingbird, Romeo & Juliet, Tuesdays with Morrie, and The Odyssey **Sophomore College Prep:** In the Time of the Butterflies, A Long Way Gone, A Midsummer Night's Dream **Sophomore Honors:** A Midsummer Night's Dream, Night, MAUS, and various Greek dramas **Junior College Prep:** Animal Farm, The Great Gatsby, Taming of the Shrew, and numerous foundational texts from American literature **Junior Honors:** 1984, Death of a Salesman, The Great Gatsby, Taming of the Shrew, and a survey of American literature from the founding of our country to present day.

Seniors: Frankenstein, Macbeth, The Canterbury Tales.

<u>Senior AP:</u> Frankenstein, Hamlet, The Awakening, Their Eyes Were Watching God, A Thousand Splendid Suns, Our Town.

Students will read, analyze, research, discuss and write about the novels and plays. A focus will be given to exploring students' understanding of our beginnings and awareness of the world around them. Units reflect The Cardinal Way by emphasizing the benefits of healthy relationships, the importance of perseverance, and the development of leadership skills.

HIGH SCHOOL SOCIAL STUDIES

The 2014-2015 school year brings new challenges to the students in our high school social studies classes. The students in our American Government classes and in our American History classes have new standards that are being implemented and tested for the first time during the 2014-2015 school year. The American History classes have 33 standards that they will have to master by the end of the school year while the government classes have 24 standards that they will have to meet. These new challenges come as a result of a Bill passed by the Ohio General Assembly to increase the students academic levels as well as their critical thinking skills.

The American History and American Government examination will consist of two parts: a performance-based assessment (PBA) that will be administered approximately three-quarters (March) of the way through the year and an end-of-year (EOY) assessment that will be given near the end of the year. (May)

The Performance Based Assessment will cover 22 standards in American History and 15 standards in American Government. The PBA will assess the student's knowledge of material from approximately the first three-quarters of the course, as specified in this document. The assessment will consist of approximately 12 items worth a total of 20 points. It will require students to engage with course content at a significant cognitive depth and a meaningful level of analysis. Following the PARCC model, the PBA will present a combination of discrete items and tasks, or sets of items linked to stimuli that engage significant content aligned to the model curriculum. Examples of a task stimulus include a set of data tables or charts, a simulation or a set of passages or maps, all of which are linked by a central theme. The sequence of items associated with the stimulus draws the student into deeper analysis and interpretation of the source materials than might ordinarily be possible in a single item. Each task might consist of one or more hand-scored constructed-response items or technology-enhanced graphic-response items that require the student to construct, rather than select, a response.

The EOY assessment will cover the entire content of the course as specified in this document. It will be administered as close as possible to the end of the year (after approximately 90% of the course has been completed). All EOY assessment items will be scored by computer, making possible a very quick return of scores. Like the PBA, the EOY assessment will contain a combination of item types, but approximately 50% of the points on the examination will come from selected-response (multiplechoice) items. The remainder will be a combination of technology -enhanced items (short-answer and graphic-response items).

Both the PBA and the EOY assessment are fixed forms that are administered in an online format. The PBA is different in that, in addition to technology-enhanced items (i.e., graphic-response and short-answer items), it also contains constructed-response items that require the student to type a response into the computer interface. These items are scored by human scorers rather than by computer. The lead time needed to score the items means that the PBA must be administered approximately three-quarters of the way through the year. Outcomes are reported to schools by the end of the year. After the student has completed both parts of the examination, his or her scores will be combined to yield a comprehensive view of the student's progress.

The students in both our American History and American Government classes have been given the standards and learning goals and I believe they will meet these challenges the "Cardinal Way" with much determination and grit.

At the present time and in the upcoming months, the students in our Government classes will be dealing with such topics as civic involvement, civic participation and skills, basic principles of the U.S. Constitution, structure and functions of the Federal Government, role of the People, Ohio's state and local governments, public policy, and government and the economy.

In our American History classes, the students have been studying the impact of some of America's most important documents that have helped to develop the principles and goals of our government and our lives. The following documents that they have analyzed are: the Declaration of Independence, Articles of Confederation, the Northwest Ordinance of 1787, the United States Constitution, and the Bill of Rights. In the upcoming months we will be investigating the Industrialization period, Imperialism, Progressive Era, World War I, etc.

HIGH SCHOOL SCIENCE NEWS

Dan and I are very excited to start off the new school year. We have each added another class to our science curriculum and look forward to exploring those topics. Dan Kanney has added AP Biology, and with the purchase of some new technology especially designed for the topics he will be teaching, he is looking forward to his classes. I have added a class of Astronomy to my curriculum and look forward to delving into the vast universe with the students.

We are also looking into the possibility of a Science Club and determining if there will be enough interest to support it. We would like to take an advisory role in this club and have it run based off the students and student ideas. It has been great to see so many young faces coming into class excited about school and learning. As the year progresses and we become more hands-on and inquiry-based, I believe the students will still be eager to learn and I look forward to a great year!


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Spanish Club Travels to Europe



KINDERGARTEN CLINIC SCREENING

The annual Kindergarten Clinic Screening will be held in the elementary library on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, March 24th, 25th, and 26th. Children eligible for admission to kindergarten next fall are required to attend. Children must be five years of age on or before August 1, 2015, in order to enter.

Children and parents attending the screening clinic will be met by a number of people, all of whom are taking part in the Kindergarten Assessment Program. We remind everyone that parents and children will be spending <u>at least 1 1/2 hours</u> with us at the clinic. If at all possible, it is best if younger and/or other children do <u>not</u> accompany the preschooler and his/her parents to the clinic.

In order to provide an efficient clinic, appointment times will be set up at intervals. <u>Being</u> on time is very important if we are to keep the clinic running smoothly. Parents of children registered for kindergarten will receive a letter indicating their <u>appointment date</u> <u>and time</u>. Appointment letters will be mailed out sometime in January.

Parents are reminded to bring their child's <u>Birth Certificate</u>, <u>Social Security Card</u>, <u>Immunization Record and Custody Papers (if divorced)</u> when attending the clinic. In accordance with state law, all children must have the following immunizations before entering school:

DTP - 4 or more doses-Booster after age 4

POLIO - Injectable and oral combination - 4 or more doses All oral doses or all injectable - 3 or more doses. One dose must be given after 4 years of age.

MMR - 2 doses after 1 year of age and at least 28 days apart

HEPATITIS B - 3 doses with 3rd on or after 24 weeks of age (Recommended for all 0-18 years olds.)

VARICELLA - 2 doses after 1 year of age unless child has had disease (chicken pox)

Parking for the clinic will be available on Plum Street. Please use the elementary entrance. Thank you for your cooperation.
