SCHOOL SAFETY AND SECURITY REQUIREMENTS

This year, the district worked very closely with Homeland Security to create a new school safety plan. The district revised their comprehensive Emergency Operations Plan in order to be in compliance with the safety guidelines set by Homeland Security and the State Department of Education. I want to assure you that the safety of our students and staff is our top priority. This plan is reviewed periodically with members from the local Fire, Police, and EMS departments to stay up-to-date and to be organized if a situation were to occur. Building Principals make sure emergency drills are regularly practiced with the students and staff. For anyone to access the schools, they must be buzzed in by the secretary, sign in at the desk, and wear a visitor's badge. If an individual is not wearing a badge, the students and staff have been instructed to notify the office of this person ASAP. The Auglaize County Sheriff's Department held A.L.I.C.E. (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate) training for new staff in October on how to prepare and respond to emergency situations. All NB staff are trained and regularly practice safety drills.

If an emergency were to occur at either school building, I want parents to know that they will be notified through the One Call Alert system as quickly as possible of the situation and where the re-unification location will be if needed. In a crisis situation, emergency vehicles and personnel will need to get to the school. Parents are asked not to come to the school, but to wait at the re-unification location for updates and to pick up their children. Please understand that your child's safety is our number one priority. We must keep a clear path for our first responders in order to keep any situation under control.

New Bremen Schools strive to promote a culture of safety and trust. I ask that you talk with your children about the importance of sharing information that could be considered as threatening to students, schools, and community with a responsible adult.

As we move into the season of weather delays and closings, please listen for our notifications on our One Call Alert System, WHIO and WLIO, or listen to WCSM (96.7), WKKI (94.3). We will work hard to notify you as early as possible if there is a delay or a closing.

We have many activities happening in our schools during the next few months. Please see the district calendar on our website. These events include concerts, Grandparents Day, and sports events. Please come and support our Cardinals!

Finally, it is the time of year when we think about gratitude. New Bremen Local Schools would like to extend their gratitude to the students, parents, and community for your support and participation with the schools!

PRE-BOND WORK

The Ohio Facilities Construction Commission (OFCC) conducted their assessment on September 10, 2015. The evaluation included updated information from the previous assessments completed by the OFCC. On October 14, 2015, Garmann/Miller completed their assessments of both of our buildings. We looked at the high school for potential repairs and updates that might be necessary for the future. Garmann/Miller will create a report that will compare their assessments to the OFCC. The additional information will help determine if we do a renovation project or if we do a new construction project. The pre-bond work will be used as a guide to determine if the district can do a renovation project or if the cost of the renovation project will exceed the state's threshold for support. If the cost of the renovation project exceeds the state's threshold for support, the assessment will be used to determine how much square footage is allowed for new construction. The Board of Education will need to know the cost of a renovation or new construction in order to get the approval for new millage from the taxpayers to complete the project. We encourage you to participate in this process. I will be keeping you updated throughout the process through the newsletter and social media, and be available to answer questions for you. K-4 PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

K-4 Activities:

- The Cardinal Jets running club completed another successful season! Approximately 190 students in grades K-6 practiced weekly after school during the month of September. They finished the season with two culminating events. They ran prior to the varsity football game on Friday, September 18th and prior to the cross country meet on Thursday, October 1st. This was a wonderful experience for all the students and volunteers involved.
- This fall, students have been busy taking various assessments. Our kindergarten students completed the Kindergarten Readiness Assessment (KRA). This assessment looks at how prepared students are coming into kindergarten and assists us in providing intervention and enrichment activities. Students in grades two and four took the Stanford Achievement Test and the Otis Lennon School Aptitude Test. Both of these tests are used for gifted identification. Our third grade students will be taking the new Ohio's State Reading Assessment on December 3rd and 4th. Students who do not pass in December will have another opportunity to take the test in April. The results of the December assessment will be back in January.

- Members from the New Bremen Fire Department presented a fire safety program to our students in grades one through three on Friday, October 9th in recognition of Fire Prevention Week. Our kindergarten students had the opportunity to look at a fire truck close up and ask our local fire fighters questions about the truck and what it is like being a fire fighter. Also during this week, students practiced emergency situations including a lockdown, evacuation, and fire drill.
- Right to Read Week will be held October 26-30th. Our theme this year is *Monster Book Fair – Reading is So Much Fun, You'll Get Goosebumps!* Students will be challenged to read a combined total of 50,000 minutes throughout the week. Students and staff will be participating in daily dress up days, trivia questions, a door decorating contest, and culminating events for the final day. The book fair will be open to the public on Monday, November 2nd from 4:00-8:30 p.m. with monster face painting from 4:00-6:00 p.m.
- Parent-teacher conferences are scheduled for the evenings of November 2nd and 5th and during the day on November 6th. This year, we are again utilizing an online scheduling program for conferences. This process assists parents in scheduling appointment times that best suit their needs as well as frees up valuable instructional time.
- Students in grades K-2 have been invited by Lock One Community Arts to the theater production of "Madeline and the Bad Hat". This production will be held at our high school on November 17th. This will be a great theater experience by a national touring company right here at home!
- The annual Christmas Musical will be held December 11th. This year's musical is entitled *The Nutcracker* and will feature our second grade students. Show times will be at 9:30 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. and is open to the public.
- Our August and September character Word of the Month was courage. Congratulations to the following students on being our Word of the Month winners for showing courage here at school: Josie Albers (Kindergarten), Willy Canseco (1st Grade), Abby Homan (2nd Grade), Leah Luedeke (3rd Grade), and Don Soldini (4th Grade).

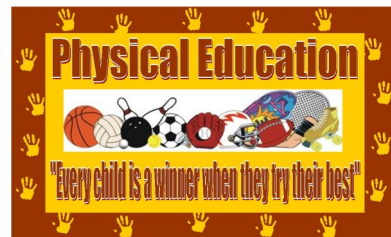
ELEMENTARY ART

SIXTH GRADE NEWS

You can be so proud of your sixth grade class! They really have been working hard and putting forth the effort needed to do well. In science, they have been displaying grit as they study everything about rocks and minerals. From identifying 18 rocks and 8 minerals using different tests and characteristics to journeying through the rock cycle, they have worked hard and hopefully had a little fun along the way. After the holidays, we will be starting Life Science. Social Studies has taken us to Ancient Mesopotamia, Canaan, and now we have landed in Egypt. Our students have traveled down the Nile in a faluka and will soon have to work in groups to complete several tasks in order for their Egyptian Civilization to survive.

Recently, the sixth grade math class finished its numbers unit. During this unit we studied integers, rational numbers, factors, and multiples. We are currently finishing up our module on number operations in which we dealt with adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing fractions. The next module we will be studying deals with operations with decimals, in which we will add, subtract, multiply, and divide them.

In reading and language arts, the sixth graders are working on becoming better writers by focusing on specific writing goals every few weeks. In addition, the students describe the highlights of their week in short journal entries to their parents every Friday. I love seeing the smiles on my students' faces when they tell me that their parents wrote back! Previously, we have been learning to identify the different elements of fictional and informational texts and we researched the causes of the Civil War, the topic of one of our historical fiction stories, while talking about reliable Internet sources. We have utilized our classroom iPads to complete grammar and comprehension small group centers using IXL Language, Newsela, and Compass Learning.

As a culminating project for the first nine weeks, the students will write a fictional narrative in which they describe hosting their very own Halloween party while including sensory writing and figurative language. I can't wait to read about the bloodcurdling party décor, bizarre menu items, bone-chilling games, and creepy costumes at their party! In guided reading, we are well into our first novels *On My Honor*, *Sunder*, and *Hatchet* and have learned to conduct great discussions. I will continue to introduce new, exciting topics to challenge my students academically this year, but also to teach them important moral and life lessons. I am very excited about my "kids" this year. I feel like they are growing literally and figuratively right in front of my eyes. I'm honored to be a part of this process and seeing them mature academically, socially, and emotionally.

FIFTH AND SIXTH GRADE INTERVENTION

The fifth and sixth grade students are becoming more and more comfortable and organized with their new responsibilities this year. Both grade levels provide many new challenges and learning opportunities for all of the students. In the first nine weeks of school, we really focused on organizing their planners and keeping together the appropriate books and folders needed for each class. I am very busy going into each of the classrooms and teaching as well as pulling students out, as needed, according to their goals for the year.

The fifth graders are using a new site called "Newsela" in my resource room. This site allows the students to read any news article they wish and take a short quiz over them. This site is great for the students because it allows them to be exposed to an expository text each week along with keeping up with the news around the world. Currently, they are creating their first reading book projects over any book they have read this year. They are designing a front cover and learning how to summarize their stories into two paragraphs while first using a graphic organizer.

The sixth graders just finished writing a five paragraph composition about their town. They had to include the research they had found in their composition. The students have shown great improvement with their writing this year. Along with writing, they will be reading four novels and creating novel projects to go with them. Each of the novels are correlated to their specific reading and comprehension level. They are currently working on their first project over the novel "Wonder".

I can't wait to see each student's growth over the next three nine weeks.

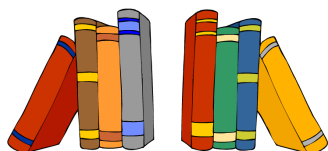
SEVENTH GRADE LANGUAGE ARTS

Welcome to seventh grade language arts. We are having a great year. In reading, we will begin Collection 8 - Elements of Drama. Collection 8 is a collection of dramatic stories. In December, we will read *A Christmas Carol: Scrooge and Marley* by Charles Dickens and Israel Horovitz. The literary focus for *A Christmas Carol* will be elements of drama, conflict, and visualizing while reading. Then, in January, we will read a second drama titled: *Monsters Are Due on Maple Street (A Twilight Zoneplay)* by Rod Serling. The literary focus for *Monsters Are Due on Maple Street* will be elements of plot and author's purpose.

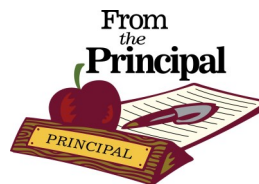
In English, students will write a personal narrative story and a persuasive speech. Also, we will review the Conventions of English, which are the eight parts of speech before moving onto sentence types, dangling modifiers, and adding comma(s) between adjectives and coordinating adjectives.

Again this year, we will include technology into our seventh grade language arts curriculum. Students will have mini lessons to develop skills associated with writing a research paper. Such skills would include: paraphrasing, direct quoting, identifying valid sources, and in-text citing. We will continue using the Internet to reinforce language skills such as parts of speech and punctuation.

Seventh grade has replaced AR with other activities designed to enhance student learning while reading books from our library. Such activities include various projects and writing assignments. During the 2nd quarter, seventh graders will be reading outside of class the following books: *Park's Quest*, *Lyddie* and *Star Girl*. Students will take a STARS assessment during the first two weeks of January. This assessment will aid in determining a range of reading proximity (reading level) for each student.

HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

We have many career-related activities that our students participate in to give them an opportunity to explore potential careers after high school. We offer local industry tours and a multi-district Exploration Academy. We also include resume development in class and character building activities with soft skills development offered via a variety of venues in which future potential careers and work-related skills are developed and explored. The pathway of offerings can now be viewed on our website so you can facilitate your child as they develop their plan using the outlined Career Development Roadmap which is broken down by curricular offerings, Student Success Plan, and university/business connections. For more in-depth questions or information related to specific offerings, please contact the office, your child's English Teacher, Financial Literacy (& Career Explorations) Teacher, Mrs. Ahlers, or Guidance Counselor, Mrs. Wendel.

Two speakers are scheduled for our students to give them insight into leadership development and what it means to be an American and the sacrifices some people gave for our country. Joel Penton, former Ohio State Buckeye Football Player and winner of the "Humanitarian Heisman," spoke to all 6-12 grade students on leadership and character development topics on October 13th. Captain Guy Gruters, will speak on November 13th about his time as a Fighter Pilot, Prisoner of War during the Vietnam conflict, and Chief Executive Officer of a company. Both of these speakers are nationally recognized and we are fortunate with their local ties allowing us to bring them in as one is from Van Wert and the other currently lives in Sidney, Ohio.

Our students have many leadership opportunities available to them. Recently, we have combined my Student Leadership Group of voted student leaders with Mrs. Heckman's newly formed Student District Leadership Team of voluntary students. The two groups were almost identical in membership so we combined the two groups. Initially, we have had our first group meeting to explore potential outlets for our group to expand the, "We Are Cardinals" brand and infiltrate and combine the districts students at both buildings through various leadership activities. I took a group of students to the University of Dayton Arena to hear The Harbor provided by Josten's speaker Mike Smith on his tour across the country. Here, 2,000 local students heard his message and life story related to how to leave a positive legacy by your actions. He also spoke on how to make a difference in other people's lives through volunteer work as he has started several non-profits. He also explained how other simple actions of goodwill have led him down a path of helping others throughout his adult life by actions he started taking while still in high school.

Homecoming weekend was great! Brennan Topp was named King and Teresa Homan was named the Queen. Students even did a square dance at the dance as requested by the seniors. Maybe this will become a tradition that students will continue into the future?

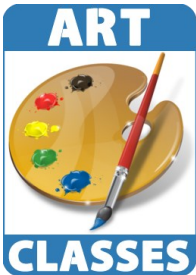

The students have the freedom to create characters and character movements, add word bubbles, add pictures, and make their comic unique to them and their topic. This website is very user-friendly and the students really enjoy using it. Their comics are very creative and informative at the same time. Students seem to take a little more ownership of their learning since they really want to create something neat. When they present they get to show the class their comic. It is much more fun and interesting. The Biology classes have begun their projects on threats to biodiversity and human impact on the environment. I have attached a portion of one student’s presentation. As you can see, this is quite different from a PowerPoint presentation. I am looking forward to viewing the finished products.

HIGH SCHOOL ENGLISH

As it seems to do every year, the first nine weeks seems to have coasted by and the second nine weeks is upon us. Pre-AP English 9, freshman on the AP English path, spent the first nine weeks working with the same content as College Prep English 9. Freshmen began the year working on close reading strategies and recognizing conflict in works of literature. As we moved forward, students began improving upon their writing skills as we worked through the process of writing a standard five paragraph essay. Students went through the writing process in a workshop-like fashion, receiving help and, at times, constructive criticism from their peers. Most recently, students finished a unit over several short stories, completing activities and literary analysis along the way.

Pre-AP English 9 will soon move on to the history of world literature, spending time on literature of several civilizations from history. After doing so, students will work together on a research project where they will choose one civilization, compile research, complete a project covering their civilization, and present their research project to the class.

Sophomores in English 10 started the year similar to freshmen, reviewing close reading strategies and discussing conflict in literature. We then moved on to reading the novel *Speak*, written by Laurie Halse Anderson, a story that follows a teenage girl's path through her freshman year of high school. Thanks to Mrs. Theresa Newbright, College Prep Sophomores were able to utilize some of the same activities that Pre-AP Sophomores completed. After reading the novel, students took part in a Socratic seminar, a student-led discussion that focused on the ideas, issues, and values from *Speak*. The novel brings up issues such as bullying, depression, and sexual abuse. I want to convey my admiration for the entire sophomore class for the respect and maturity that they exhibited in the seminar. Most recently, students completed a project where they had to write a sequel to W.W. Jacobs' short story, "The Monkey's Paw," a story that warns its readers to be careful what they wish for.

I look forward to the rest of this school year where we will continue to grow as readers, writers, and individuals.

What is a SWOT Analysis? What is the current marketing mix for a company? Should adjustments be made to the marketing mix? Ask any marketing student and they will be able to help you with these questions. They can tell you a SWOT analysis is evaluating a company's internal strengths and weaknesses and external opportunities and threats and the marketing mix is comprised of a business's product, place, price, and promotion – the 4 P's! Marketing students were able to try their hand at conducting a SWOT Analysis for a company, determining the marketing mix, and offering suggestions as to how the company may improve its profits based on these analyses. They are currently working on a unit project in which they are assuming the role of employees for a marketing firm. They have been approached by a business to analyze the current market and help their client decide whether or not the business should enter the market. Students will conduct a SWOT analysis and PEST Analysis, determine the target market and create a marketing mix for the business based on their research. Students will also conduct interviews with people in the target market to gain additional information on the customers' needs and wants. After pulling all their research together and making their analysis, the students will provide advice to their client about the potential business venture. These activities give students a first-hand look at marketing in the real-world.

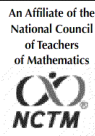

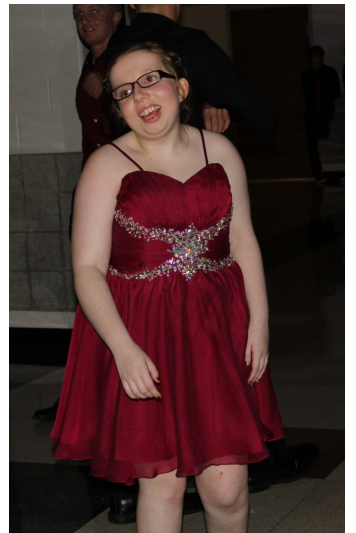

KINDERGARTEN CLINIC SCREENING

The annual Kindergarten Clinic Screening will be held in the elementary library on Tuesday, April 12th, and Wednesday, April 13th. Children eligible for admission to kindergarten next fall are required to attend. Children must be five years of age on or before August 1, 2016, in order to enter.

Children and parents attending the screening clinic will be met by a number of people, all of whom are taking part in the Kindergarten Assessment Program. We remind everyone that parents and children will be spending at least 1 1/2 hours with us at the clinic. If at all possible, it is best if younger and/or other children do not accompany the preschooler and his/her parents to the clinic.

In order to provide an efficient clinic, appointment times will be set up at intervals. Being on time is very important if we are to keep the clinic running smoothly. Parents of children registered for kindergarten will receive a letter indicating their appointment date and time. Appointment letters will be mailed out sometime in January.

Parents are reminded to bring their child's Birth Certificate, Social Security Card, Immunization Record and Custody Papers (if divorced) when attending the clinic. In accordance with state law, all children must have the following immunizations before entering school:

- DTP - 4 or more doses - Booster after age 4
- POLIO - Injectable and oral combination - 4 or more doses. All oral doses or all injectable - 3 or more doses. One dose must be given after 4 years of age.
- MMR - 2 doses after 1 year of age and at least 28 days apart
- HEPATITIS B - 3 doses with 3rd on or after 24 weeks of age (Recommended for all 0-18 years olds.)
- VARICELLA - 2 doses after 1 year of age unless child has had disease (chicken pox)
