# SCHOOL SAFETY AND SECURITY REQUIREMENTS

Last year, the district worked very closely with Homeland Security to create a new school safety plan. The district revised their comprehensive Emergency Operations Plan in order to be in compliance with the safety guidelines set by Homeland Security and the State Department of Education. I want to assure you that the safety of our students and staff is our top priority. This plan is reviewed yearly and updated by the school, members from the local Fire, Police, and EMS departments to stay up-to-date and to be organized if a situation were to occur. Building Principals make sure emergency drills are regularly practiced with the students and staff. For anyone to access the schools, they must be buzzed in by the secretary, sign in at the desk, and wear a visitor's badge. If an individual is not wearing a badge, the students and staff have been instructed to notify the office of this person ASAP. The Auglaize County Sheriff's Department held A.L.I.C.E. (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate) training for new staff in August on how to prepare and respond to emergency situations. All NB staff are trained and regularly practice safety drills.

If an emergency were to occur at either school building, I want parents to know that they will be notified through the One Call Alert system as quickly as possible of the situation and where the reunification location will be if needed. In a crisis situation, emergency vehicles and personnel will need to get to the school. Parents are asked not to come to the school, but to wait at the re-unification location for updates and to pick up their children. Please understand that your child's safety is our number one priority. We must keep a clear path for our first responders in order to keep any situation under control.

New Bremen Schools strive to promote a culture of safety and trust. I ask that you talk with your children about the importance of sharing information that could be considered as threatening to students, schools, and community with a responsible adult.

As we move into the season of weather delays and closings, please listen for our notifications on our One Call Alert System, WHIO and WLIO, or listen to WCSM (96.7), WKKI (94.3). Please note that we will also post notifications on the district webpage and on our social media accounts. We will work hard to notify you as early as possible if there is a delay or a closing.

We have many activities happening in our schools during the next few months. Please see the district calendar on our website. These events include concerts, fundraisers, and sports events. Please come and support our Cardinals!

Finally, it is the time of year when we think about gratitude. New Bremen Local Schools would like to extend their gratitude to the students, parents, and community for your support and participation with the schools!

#### K - 4 PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

#### K-4 Activities:

- The Cardinal Jets running club completed another successful season! Approximately 190 students in grades K-6 practiced weekly after school during the month of September. They finished the season with two culminating events. They ran prior to the varsity football game on Friday, September 16 and prior to the cross country meet on Thursday, September 29. This was a wonderful experience for all the students and volunteers involved.
- This year's character education program is highlighting the 7 Habits of Healthy Kids. The healthy habit for August and September was being proactive. Congratulations to the following students on being our Habit of the Month winners for being proactive here at school: Olivia Mescher (Kindergarten), Sophia Tangeman (1<sup>st</sup> Grade), Grayson Tinnerman (2<sup>nd</sup> Grade), Layla Fullenkamp (3<sup>rd</sup> Grade), and Sam Bernhold (4<sup>th</sup> Grade).
- This fall, students have been busy taking various kindergarten assessments. Our students completed Kindergarten Readiness the Assessment (KRA). This assessment looks at how prepared students are comina kindergarten and assists us in providing intervention and enrichment activities. Students in grades one through three were administered Reading Diagnostic assessments to determine on track and not on track status for reading on grade level. Our students in grades two and four took the Terra Nova Achievement Test and the In View cognitive abilities test. Both of these tests are used for gifted identification. Our third grade students will be taking the Ohio's State Reading Assessment on November 8 and 9. who do not pass in November will have another opportunity to take the test in April. The results of the November assessment will be available in December.

- Members from the New Bremen Fire Department presented a fire safety program to our students in grades one through three on Friday, October 21 in recognition of Fire Prevention Week. Our kindergarten students had the opportunity to look at a fire truck close up and ask our local firefighters questions about the truck and what it is like being a firefighter. Also during this week, students practiced emergency situations including a lockdown, evacuation, and fire drill.
- Parent-teacher conferences are scheduled for the evenings of October 31 and November 3 and during the day on November 4. This year, we are again utilizing an online scheduling program for conferences. This process assists parents in scheduling appointment times that best suit their needs as well as frees up valuable instructional time.
- Right to Read Week will be held November 7-11. Our theme this year is Bookaneer Book Fair Where books are the treasure! Students will be challenged to read a combined total of 50,000 minutes throughout the week. Students and staff will be participating in daily dress up days, trivia questions, a door decorating contest, and culminating events for the final day. The book fair will be open to the public on Monday, November 3 from 4-8:30 p.m. and November 4 from 8-11:30 a.m. and 12:30-3:00 p.m. As a final activity, we have a guest author, David Hyde Costello, coming to present to students in grades K-4.
- Students in grades 4-6 have been invited by Lock One Community Arts to the theater production of "Jigsaw Jones and the Case of the Class Clown". This production will be held at our high school auditorium on November 17. This will be a great theater experience by a national touring company right here at home!
- The annual Christmas Musical will be held Thursday, December 8. This year's musical is entitled *The Elves and The Shoemaker* and will feature our second grade students. Show times will be at 9:30 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. and is open to the public.


# ELEMENTARY ART



You can be so proud of your sixth grade student!! They really have been working hard and putting forth the effort needed to do well. In science, they have been displaying grit as they study everything rocks and minerals! From identifying 18 rocks and 8 minerals using different tests and characteristics to journeying through the rock cycle, they have worked hard and hopefully had a little fun along the way. After the holidays, we will be starting Life Science. Social Studies has taken us to Ancient Mesopotamia and Canaan where we have experienced surviving in a group is much easier than surviving on our own. They have created their own civilizations and we will soon take a faluka boat ride down the Nile River as we journey through ancient Here they will be working in groups to complete several tasks in order for their Egyptian Empire to survive!

Recently, the sixth grade math class finished its numbers unit. During this unit, we studied integers, rational numbers, factors, and multiples. We are currently finishing up our module on number operations in which we dealt with adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing fractions. The next module we will be studying deals with operations with decimals, in which we will add, subtract, multiply, and divide them.

In reading and language arts, the sixth graders are working on becoming better writers by focusing on specific writing goals every few weeks. In addition, the students describe the highlights of their week in short journal entries to their parents every Friday. I love seeing the smiles on my students' faces when they tell me that their parents wrote back! Previously, we have been learning to identify the different elements of fictional and informational texts and we researched the causes of the Civil War, the topic of one of our historical fiction stories, while talking about reliable Internet sources. We have utilized our classroom iPads to complete grammar and comprehension small group centers using IXL Language, NewsELA and Compass Learning.

As a culminating project for the first nine weeks, the students will write a fictional narrative in which they describe hosting their very own Halloween party while including sensory details and figurative language. I can't wait to read about the bloodcurdling party décor, bizarre menu items, bone-chilling games, and creepy costumes! In guided reading, we are well into our first novels *On My Honor* and *Sounder* and have learned to conduct great discussions. I will continue to

introduce new, exciting topics to challenge my students academically this year, but also to teach them important moral and life lessons. I am very excited about my "kids" this year. I am honored to be a part of the process of seeing them mature academically, socially, and emotionally.

# FIFTH AND SIXTH GRADE INTERVENTION

The fifth and sixth grade students are becoming more and more comfortable and organized with their new responsibilities this year. Both grade levels provide many new challenges and learning opportunities. I am very busy going into each of the classrooms and teaching as well as pulling students out, as needed, according to their goals for the year.

Both grade levels are working hard to complete novels and creating book reports within groups. The students are using a new site called "Newsela" in my resource room. This site allows the students to read kid friendly expository text articles about what is going on around the world in sports, science, art, religion, school classrooms, government, and education. They also allow the students to connect with the world around them and strengthen their comprehension skills by taking short five point quizzes at the end.

Starting in the fourth nine weeks, students in the sixth grade will start reading nine different classic books and taking notes per chapter on graphic organizers while discussing together in groups what they have learned from each of the books. These books will take students out of their comfort zone because these are books that they would not have normally taken off of the shelf in the library. Note taking skills and the plot of stories will be the main focus while reading.

# SEVENTH GRADE LANGUAGE ARTS

Welcome to seventh grade language arts. We are having a great year. In reading, we will begin Collection 8 - Elements of Drama. Collection 8 is a collection of dramatic stories. In December, we will read *A Christmas Carol: Scrooge and Ma*rley by Charles Dickens and Israel Horovitz. The literary focus for *A Christmas Carol* will be elements of drama, conflict, and visualizing while reading. Then, in January, we will read a second drama titled *Monsters Are Due on Maple Street* (a "Twilight Zone" play) by Rod Serling. The literary focus for *Monsters Are Due on Maple Street* will be elements of plot and author's purpose.

In English, students will write a personal narrative story and a persuasive speech. Also, we will review the Convections of English, which are the eight parts of speech, before moving onto sentence types, dangling modifiers, and adding comma(s) between adjectives and coordinating adjectives.

Again this year, we will include technology into our seventh grade language arts curriculum. Students will have mini lessons to develop skills associated with writing research papers. Such skills would include: paraphrasing, direct quoting, identifying valid sources, and in-text citing. We will continue using the Internet to reinforce language skills such as parts of speech and punctuation.

Seventh grade has replaced AR with other activities designed to enhance student learning while reading books from our library. Such activities include various projects and writing assignments. During the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter, seventh graders will be reading outside of class the following books: *Park's Quest, Lyddie* and *Star Girl*. Students will take an STARS assessment during the first two weeks of January. This assessment will aid in determining a range of reading proximity (reading level) for each student.

It is hard to believe that we are almost through the first quarter of another school year. My science classes are hard at work exploring a variety of topics. In Biology, we are finishing up our unit on ecology by exploring the impact that humans have on the environment. The students are creating cartoons using an online program to present on a variety of topics such as pollution, deforestation, and habitat loss among others. After we finish ecology, we will move into cellular biology and start working with microscopes.

In Chemistry, we are currently finishing our unit on heat and calorimetry. Students are doing laboratory activities to find the specific heat of some unknown metals. Soon we will continue our studies by looking at concepts such as isotopes and the mole. These ideas are essential to understanding the content that we will cover the rest of the year. If you ask your student what their favorite number is in Chemistry, they should tell you  $6.02x10^{23}$ . If they don't say that, then they have let me down. Ha ha.

AP Biology is wrapping up the unit on the tour of the cell and will soon be looking at osmosis and diffusion through a plasma membrane. The students will conduct multiple labs on these topics that align with the AP curriculum. Following osmosis and diffusion, we will focus on cellular energy. The class is moving fast, but this year's AP group is a good one and are working very hard.

# NEWS FROM THE ENGINEERING LAB

The first nine weeks is almost complete and the students have been very active with engineering and manufacturing projects.

We have implemented the updated PLTW curriculum which gives the students new experiences in project-base learning such as: tooth pick bridge building, trash sorter, and compound simple machine design. We have also downloaded the latest version of Auto Desk Inventor keeping us on the cutting edge of computer aided design software.

Within the manufacturing lab, the students in Woods I have been working very hard on their footstool projects and will soon be picking and designing a second project. As for the metals class, they are beginning to arc and mig weld. They need to develop there welding skills to complete the six required welds.

As for the engineering lab, the students in the Introduction to Engineering class have been busy learning about the different types of drawings and how to construct them, getting them prepared to start Autodesk Inventor within the next few days. The Principle of Engineering class has been compound working with simple machines. understanding their mechanical advantages, ratios, and implantations. 


# HIGH SCHOOL ENGLISH NEWS





# NEW BREMEN FFA NAMED THREE STAR NATIONAL CHAPTER BY THE NATIONAL FFA ORGANIZATION



The contest requires students to measure soil slope, topsoil depth, depth to restrictive soil layer, determine drainage class of soil, determine soil structure type, evaluate nutrient needs of soil as well as determine best management practices for the soil in an agricultural setting.

# KINDERGARTEN CLINIC SCREENING

The annual Kindergarten Clinic Screening will be held in the elementary library on Tuesday, March 28th, and Wednesday, March 29th. Children eligible for admission to kindergarten next fall are required to attend. Children must be five years of age on or before August 1, 2017, in order to enter.

Children and parents attending the screening clinic will be met by a number of people, all of whom are taking part in the Kindergarten Assessment Program. We remind everyone that parents and children will be spending at least 1 1/2 hours with us at the clinic. If at all possible, it is best if younger and/or other children do not accompany the preschooler and his/her parents to the clinic.

In order to provide an efficient clinic, appointment times will be set up at intervals. Being on time is very important if we are to keep the clinic running smoothly. Parents of children registered for kindergarten will receive a letter indicating their appointment date and time. Appointment letters will be mailed out sometime in January.

Parents are reminded to bring their child's Birth Certificate, Social Security Card, Immunization Record and Custody Papers (if applicable) when attending the clinic. In accordance with state law, all children must have the following immunizations before entering school:

DTP - 4 or more doses - Booster after age 4

POLIO - Injectable and oral combination - 4 or more doses. All oral doses or all injectable - 3 or more doses. One dose must be given after 4 years of age.

MMR - 2 doses after 1 year of age and at least 28 days apart

HEPATITIS B - 3 doses with 3rd on or after 24 weeks of age (Recommended for all 0-18 years olds.)

VARICELLA - 2 doses after 1 year of age unless child has had disease (chicken pox)

Parking for the clinic will be available on Plum Street. Please use the elementary entrance. Thank you for your cooperation.


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
