Congratulation to the Class of 2025



It is with great pride and excitement that New Bremen Local School District invites family and friends to celebrate the achievements of the Class of 2025 at their commencement ceremony on May 25th at 1:00 PM in the high school gym. We would like to extend our heartfelt congratulations and best wishes to the Class of 2025 as they embark on their future endeavors. Whether they are continuing their education, entering the workforce, or pursuing other aspirations, we are confident that they will make a positive impact wherever they go. We hope you will join us in recognizing and supporting these outstanding graduates. Your encouragement and presence will make this day even more memorable.

Safety Alert- Three-Way-Stop

The district will be adding stop signs on the drive exiting to Kettler Road from the rear parking lot at Cardinal Street. This will create a three-way-stop at the intersection of the school drive and Cardinal Street. The purpose of the change is to reduce the speed of vehicles using the drive and improve the safety of the cross-walk used by students traveling to and from school. The change is scheduled for this spring and will be announced to students and parents prior to being implemented.

New Budget Bill Debate Continues

The state legislature implemented a new school funding formula, the Fair School Funding Plan, into law in 2021. Ohio is currently in the fourth year of what was developed to be a six-year implementation. The Governor's budget bill, as introduced, includes years five and six of the phase-in but does not include an update of the cost inputs (freezing them at 2022 levels). By using outdated cost inputs, the formula is out of balance and does not recognize the inflationary increases we are all experiencing. This means districts receive less money from the state, resulting in local communities paying more of the costs to educate children. The new budget is still being debated with the state legislature expected to have their own version out in early April. We will continue to monitor the debate and advocate for our local school system. The new budget bill will need to be passed by June 30, 2025.

Facility Update

The board was presented with a schematic floor plan for high school office and concession renovations. The project will improve building security by increasing visibility at the entrance and providing additional office space for personnel that have frequent external visitors. Work for the renovation project would take place this summer.

The district has several facility projects scheduled for summer break. The emergency evacuation system in the high school will be upgraded to a voice system to bring it up to code. The district received a \$40,000 safety grant for this improvement which is estimated to cover a majority of the cost. Some other items scheduled for replacement and repair include HVAC components, plumbing and Wi-Fi access points. Please be aware that certain sections of the building may have limited access while work is being completed.



New Bremen Schools has four staff members retiring this year, Mrs. Cindy Evers, Mrs. Heather Moeller, Mrs. Amy Poeppelman, and Mrs. Donna Schmitmeyer. Their passion for education and commitment to our students has left an unforgettable mark on our school and community. Immunization Schedule Attention Parents of All Incoming Seventh & Twelfth Grade Students of the 2025-2026 School Year

All incoming seventh grade students will be required to have one (1) Tdap vaccine and one (1) Meningococcal MCV4 vaccine prior to entry into the new school year. All incoming twelfth grade students will be required to have two (2) Meningococcal MCV4 vaccines prior to entry into the new school year. If the first (1st) dose was administered on or after the sixteenth birthday, a second (2nd) dose is not required.

Immunizations may be obtained at your primary physician's office or at the Auglaize County Health Department. It is now necessary to schedule an appointment at the Health Department at 419-738-3410 option 4. Please turn in a copy of the updated immunization record, once the vaccines have been completed, to the school office or mail to New Bremen Schools - Attention: Dianne Suchland.

It would be recommended to act quickly and beat the summer rush. Completion is required before the first day of school.

Kindergarten & First Grade Intervention

The school year is flying by! The students are working hard to grow and learn every day. Many exciting things are happening during intervention time in kindergarten and first grade.

Kindergarten students have been working hard to learn the letter names and sounds, along with correctly writing each letter. These skills help students build automaticity in letter and sound recognition, which is needed to read and write as they grow older. They have also been practicing the phonemic awareness skills of blending and segmenting. Students have to successfully blend all the sounds in a word to read the word correctly. To spell a word correctly, students first have to segment the word into its sounds and then write the letter (or letters) that spell that sound. It has been so fun to watch their spelling and confidence improve as the year has gone on!

The first grade students have grown in many ways this year. As the year comes to an end, first graders are learning new syllable types to decode and spell single and multisyllabic words. They have learned about long vowels, r-controlled vowels, and the many different jobs of the letters e and y.

It is so exciting to see all the growth kids make throughout the school year. Thank you for your continued support!

In fifth grade ELA, students recently finished <u>Holes</u> and are currently reading <u>The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane</u>. Through <u>Holes</u>, students explored the themes of friendship, fate, and justice while analyzing how the story's multiple plotlines connect. In <u>Edward Tulane</u>, students are learning about empathy and personal growth as they reflect on Edward's journey and how his experiences change him. It's been exciting to watch their imaginations soar as they connect with the characters, ask thoughtful questions, and dive deeper into the stories.

We're also thrilled to welcome Mr. Jacob Robinson as a student teacher in fifth grade. He's been a fantastic addition to our classroom, bringing fresh ideas and energy to our learning environment.

In sixth grade ELA, students just wrapped up <u>James and the Giant Peach</u>. Through this novel, they explored character development and conflict resolution by discussing how James overcomes challenges and builds relationships with the other characters. These skills were reinforced through class discussions, journaling, and group projects.

In math, the sixth graders are wrapping up their March Madness projects! They're combining basketball with academics, learning new skills while sharpening their understanding of past concepts. It's been a fun and engaging way to keep math exciting.

I am proud of all of their hard work and can't wait for all the STEM adventures ahead! 🚿









Our fourth graders have been sharpening their writing skills in language class this spring! They learned how to use and order multiple adjectives, applying this to a fun creative writing assignment where they described delicious, mouth-watering hamburgers. They've also impressed us with their work on multi-paragraph opinion and explanatory essays, showing great progress in reading and analyzing texts, organizing their ideas, and using transition words to create smooth, detailed writing.

In reading they have been busy working to strengthen their comprehension skills. They've practiced identifying point of view, identifying problems and solutions within a text, using context clues, and exploring Greek and Latin roots. They've also enjoyed reading a variety of genres, including tall tales, folk tales, fantasy, and biographies. As the year winds down, they are excited to dive into more engaging class novels!

In math, fourth graders have been learning about fractions! They worked on putting fractions on a number line and finding equivalent fractions. When that became too easy, they were challenged with comparing and ordering fractions. They finally ended the chapter with converting improper fractions and mixed numbers. The students completed many hands-on and engaging activities to show their understanding. Activities such as creating pizzas, and spring crafts to demonstrate their understanding and proper usage of their fraction skills. As our year continues fourth graders will be working on geometry skills, and finding area and perimeter. They are real mathematicians!

Sixth Grade News

It is hard to believe that the last nine weeks of the school year are upon us. I am so proud of the leadership and perseverance the sixth grade students have shown inside the classroom as well as in extracurricular clubs and sports representing our school.

In science, we are finishing up our life science unit with genetics. They can now make a Punnett square, know their fingerprint patterns and created their own organism...what a busy few weeks! We will be ending the year with physical science. As an introduction to this new unit, we have made roller coasters to test and experiment with different physical science concepts such as motion and speed. They will also be studying the three states of matter and density. We will be doing a second Engineering is Elementary unit on Chemical Engineering where they will create their own play dough recipe. Social Studies will see us traveling out of India and into China. Before we travel onward, the sixth graders will be doing an activity where they will be put into a varna (class) within India's caste system. There, they will have to live the life of a person within that class. In China, we will travel the famous silk road to try and be the first group to trade all of our goods while trying to stay alive along the treacherous route. We will also be creating our own country and learning economics through the games Fetch! and Pit.



In Language Arts class our students have much to be proud of! For starters, we are now published authors! Students created original fables and illustrations that were sent to a publishing company where they were printed in an anthology of the entire sixth grade's work. Students were able to order a copy of their published work to take home where they can admire the collection of stories from their peers. I'm very proud of our students work and hope that they will keep their books to reflect on their time in sixth grade.

On the reading side of things, we've finished reading Roald Dahl's classic, <u>James and the Giant Peach</u> and have begun reading <u>Holes</u> by Louis Sachar. Some classes are in the midst or reading book one of <u>The Wizenard</u> Series by Wesley King and Kobe Bryant. These students have the fun and unique challenge of reading the story from one of five different perspectives of the main characters on a basketball team with a magical coach. As the year comes to a close, I look forward to introducing the students to our final novel of the year: <u>Long Walk to Water</u> by Linda Sue Park. The book tells the story of two youths in South Sudan who walk hundreds of miles to ensure their access to clean water for their family. Our students always enjoy this book and the final project that comes with it. We look forward to that and the fun/chaos that comes with the end of another successful school year!

In math, we are wrapping up our March Madness Project. During this project, students explored decimals, fractions, percents, probability, rates, algebra, and word problems.

In sixth grade math, we are currently working on our geometry unit. This unit covers the area of quadrilaterals, triangles, and polygons, as well as solving area equations. Additionally, we will explore the concepts of surface area and volume for various shapes.

In seventh grade math, we are finishing our unit on probability. After that, we will begin reviewing seventh-grade content while transitioning into select eighth-grade concepts.

Thank you for your ongoing support of the arts and your encouragement of your young artists. I can't wait to see what else we'll create as the year continues!


5th Grade Pi Record Broken!

Buses will run at normal time, therefore, if a student is not testing and does not have another ride, they can arrive early and sit in study hall. Secondly, students who score Proficient of higher on their state test, will not have to take their semester exam in that respective subject. In the classes where this happens, the student's final semester grade will be calculated using 50% of their third quarter and 50% of their fourth quarter scores.

News from Industrial Technology

Mr. Michael Heuker, Industrial Technology Teacher

I'm excited to share what our students have been working on this month. From fun projects in engineering to learning important skills, our students are preparing for future careers in technology and design.

7th Grade Class Update

The seventh grade class has been working on a digital electronics soldering project. They learned how to use a soldering iron to connect electronic components on a circuit board. This project taught them about how electronics work and helped them practice being precise and careful when working with small parts.

Right now, they're also working on a bridge design project. In this project, they're learning about the forces that affect a bridge, like compression (squeezing) and tension (pulling). By designing and testing virtual bridges, they're discovering how engineers make bridges strong and safe.

Woods II Class

The Woods II class just finished their skills board project. In this project, students used tools to cut, sand, and finish wood to create a board that shows different woodworking skills. It was a fun way for them to practice and improve their abilities.

Next, they'll start more challenging projects, like making custom furniture and learning new ways to work with wood.

Metals II Class

In Metals II, students have been learning to use the mill and lathe to shape metal parts. These tools help make precise metal pieces, and the students are learning how to use them safely and correctly.

Introduction to Engineering

In the Introduction to Engineering class, students are working on a reverse engineering project. They're taking apart objects to see how they are made and figuring out how they work. This helps them understand the design process and think critically about products and systems.

Principles of Engineering

The Principles of Engineering class is learning about cantilever beams. These are beams supported at only one end, like a diving board. Students are testing how different materials and designs hold up under stress, helping them understand how engineers make structures that are safe and strong.

Industrial Education Class

The Industrial Education class focuses on learning the theory behind industrial technologies. Students study how things are made, how engineers design systems, and the role technology plays in industries. While it's not a hands-on class like others, it helps students understand the basics of industrial processes and technology.

Looking Ahead

As the semester continues, students are gaining important skills that will help them in future careers. Whether they're building projects or learning concepts, they are getting ready for success in engineering, technology, and design fields.

News from the 7-12 Grade Social Studies Department

High School Government, Sociology, and Psychology

Mr. Ben Kramer, High School Social Studies Teacher

The high school government classes are busy preparing for end of course exams. The students are using on-line resources in the curriculum this year. We used the Ohio Department of Education's Restart Readiness Assessment to track student growth from the fall of the year to the spring While tracking the data, most students have shown growth between the two tests given. The government classes have also been using the Edulastic website to prepare and administer previous end of course exams. Tracking student growth is a valuable tool to ensure success on these state tests. The Government class is busy reviewing and preparing for their exam in April. The classes are using Barron's Edulastic to complete this work in addition to learning the required Supreme Court Cases. The Psychology class has concluded during the first semester for the school year. Many of our Psychology students took advantage of the CCP program and received college credit for the class. The same CCP program is being utilized for the Sociology classes this spring as well. The Personal Finance classes have enjoyed learning the basics of financial literacy. They have really enjoyed and took interest in the concept of budgeting for effective saving and learning about rate of return. There is so much to be learned! Have a good spring!

Mr. Chris Schmidt, High School Social Studies Teacher

In high school history classes, we have been exploring the 20th Century, looking at major events and their impacts.

In World History, students have taken an in-depth look at World War I and World War II, examining their causes, major battles, and lasting impacts. They have explored the complex alliances and militarism that led to World War I, as well as the Treaty of Versailles and its role in setting the stage for World War II. They have also studied the rise of totalitarian regimes and the consequences of the Holocaust, the atomic bomb, and are now studying the post-war division of the world during the Cold War.

In American History, students have explored the cultural and economic shifts of the 1920's and 1930's. The Roaring Twenties introduced them to the Harlem Renaissance, the rise of mass media, and the changing roles of women. Students examined the economic boom and consumer culture of the decade, as well as the tensions brought by Prohibition, immigration restrictions, and the resurgence of the Ku Klux Klan. Moving into the Great Depression, they analyzed the stock market crash of 1929, the struggles of everyday Americans, and President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal programs designed to address the crisis. As in World History, students in America history are currently learning about the Cold War, but with a focus on the impact on the United States.

We look forward to continuing our journey through history in the months ahead. Go Cards!

Mr. Randy Trentman, JH Social Studies Teacher

Welcome to Junior High History. We have had a great year so far and look forward to finishing the year strong.

In seventh grade world history our next two units will cover Europe's Renaissance and Reformation and Europe entering the Modern Age. We will explore how the Renaissance differed from the Middle Ages and classical times. Plus, examine changes in European life that led to the Renaissance. We will learn about ideas, problems and growth. Eventually, we will cover the age of exploration and the scientific revolution. If time remains, we will study philosophers whose ideas influenced the Enlightenment and discover new thinking about government and individual rights.

In eighth grade United States History, our next unit will cover before, during, and after the Civil War era. We will discover the deep division over slavery, visit battle grounds and face the terrors and hardships of those who suffered through one of America's bloodiest war. Then we move on to a unit that will cover the rise of industry, the Progressive Era and America becoming a world power. We will explore innovations that transformed society. Also, we will investigate the problems in America and discover how social leaders propose to deal with them. If time remains, then we will link the past to the present.

We have completed various activities, projects, role playing, movies, songs, etc. to enhance our Junior High History curriculum this year. As time allows, students have been able to look into current events from not only Ohio but from around the United States and the world.

News from the 7-12 Intervention

Junior High Intervention

During the third nine weeks, I had the opportunity to work closely with two specific seventh grade student groups as they completed their STEM projects. These groups chose to focus on 3D modeling and followed the engineering design process to bring their creative ideas to life. With the support of Mrs. Steinemann's STEM project breakdown, the students conducted research, wrote letters of patent, and created detailed designs to be printed using 3D printers. Their dedication truly stood out, as they often stayed with me after school to collaborate, make final adjustments, and prepare for their presentations. Overall, the STEM projects provided a valuable experience for these groups, that encouraged these students to work together, think critically, and express their creativity through hands-on exploration of 3D modeling technology. Hats off to all the seventh graders for their outstanding teamwork and creativity throughout the STEM process. The final presentations were a true reflection of all your hard work!



Inclusion English & Business Math

Grade 9 English

In ninth grade English class, students recently worked on developing their argumentative writing skills. This lesson emphasized crafting clear and concise thesis statements, finding credible supporting evidence, and being able to use counterclaims. Students honed their ability to construct well-organized essays to present their own arguments and acknowledge and respond to differing perspectives.

The freshman class has now embarked on an eye-opening literary journey with the book <u>Speak</u> by Laurie Halse Anderson. This powerful novel follows the story of Melinda Sordino, a high school freshman, who faces trauma and isolation while navigating the complicated social landscape of high school. As the class continues to read, the conversations and reflections surrounding the book will no doubt contribute to their own growth as individuals and as members of their community.

Grade 10 English

In tenth grade English class, sophomore students are reading Of <u>Mice and Men</u> by John Steinbeck. The class is focusing on the characters, their personalities, relationships, and motivations. The class examines how Steinbeck develops each character, exploring their interactions and individual desires. Additionally, the class delves into the social and economic issues of the Great Depression, as portrayed in the novel, and how these themes influence the characters' choices and lives.

As part of their study, students will be given an argumentative writing prompt related to the ending of the novel. They will be required to support their arguments with evidence from the text, encouraging them to critically engage with the story's themes and characters. This approach helps students develop their analytical skills while gaining insight into both the literary and historical context of <u>Of Mice and Men</u>.

Grade 11 English

In eleventh grade English class, juniors are reading <u>The Great Gatsby</u> by F. Scott Fitzgerald. This novel is set during the Roaring 1920's. Many students enjoy this book because it offers a glimpse into the glitz and glamour of the Jazz Age while also revealing the darker sides of wealth, ambition, and love. As they read, students explore themes of social class, the American Dream, and the moral decay behind the facade of wealth. Through <u>The Great Gatsby</u>, students not only gain insight into the 1920s but also learn to critically examine the ways in which society defines success and class.

Inclusion English & Business Math continued

In addition, students are working on their writing skills through their career binders. These binders are a comprehensive collection of materials that help students reflect on their future and personal development. These include resumes, next steps after graduation, and a reflection on their individual skills. This process not only helps students prepare for their future careers but also enhances their ability to express themselves through writing, helping them develop a clear and professional narrative about their goals and achievements.

Grade 12 English

In twelfth grade English class, seniors are engaging with William Shakespeare's <u>Much Ado About Nothing</u> as part of their study of his comedic works. They are reading the play together, allowing for collaborative discussion and deeper analysis of its themes, characters, and language. The collaborative nature of the class allows for diverse perspectives, encouraging students to share insights and interpret the play's humor and themes in a meaningful way.

Also, seniors have been actively reviewing and updating their career portfolios that were started last year. They are focusing on reflecting on their achievements, skills, and professional growth. They have been incorporating new experiences, such as internships, volunteer work, and any additional qualifications or certifications they have earned. Many have been refining their resumes and career narratives to ensure they accurately represent their current expertise and career aspirations. Overall, the process has helped seniors gain clarity on their professional goals and better prepare for the transition from education to the workforce.

Business Math

In Business Math, students have been diving into the world of home buying and renting, exploring not just the price of a house, but also the often-overlooked costs like property taxes and insurance. They're also getting a closer look at the complexities of purchasing or leasing a car, from the upfront price to the ongoing expenses like car insurance and maintenance. It's a hands-on approach to understanding the real-world financial decisions that come with big investments like homes and vehicles.

Life Skills I & II

Have you ever dreamed of running your own food truck, serving up mouthwatering dishes and creating a community buzz? That's exactly what the students in Life Skills I and II did this past nine weeks. Each student in the class developed their very own food truck concepts—and the results were unique.

The project began with a simple question: "What does it take to launch a successful food truck?" Students dove headfirst into research, learning about the history of food trucks, the current market trends, and the key ingredients for success in this booming industry. Food trucks have become a cultural phenomenon, offering unique culinary experiences and convenience that cater to on-the-go lifestyles.

From there, the students had to create their own food truck concepts, each with a unique theme and menu. They had to research the cost that they would pay to create their items and then come up with a cost they would charge for their items, so that their food truck would be profitable. They also had to come up with a way to serve their food items that would be easy and convenient for on-the-go options. The students developed a business plan, designed a logo and truck wrap, and even created sample menus with pricing. They also had to promote their food truck on social media by making social media post that their truck could use if they were an actual business. The project culminated in each student creating an item from their food truck and sharing it with the other students in class. • The Snack Shack: This truck served mini versions of your typical supper or lunch foods, like a mini grilled cheese And there were quiet a few sweet treat type food trucks that served cookies, cupcakes, churros and smoothies



News from Innovative Technology & Computers

The school year has been full of upgrades for our technology students! Our website has moved to newbremenhs.github.io (you can also get there with the QR code), and we've started posting regular updates on all the fun things we're doing!

In the seventh and eighth grade STEM class, we've made a standard robot and played a manufacturing game. The goal is to pick up a block and return it across the finish line in the shortest time possible. This is the root of robot design, and it's great to see students take off with it.

In the Robotics class, we went to the regional competition in Van Wert. Although we did not place highly enough to advance to the state level, we gained valuable experience and enjoyed networking with other teams. We're looking forward to a strong season next year. Currently, we are working on an outreach robot designed to enhance the STEM culture at our school and encourage the next generation of students to join this growing program!

In the Computer Science I and II classes, we've been using Minecraft: Education Edition to program a built-in robot called the Agent. Students had a lot of fun applying the programming concepts they learned in the first semester to a familiar context. They used the Agent to build Minecraft houses and farms and applied their knowledge of Boolean Logic to Minecraft's Redstone circuitry. In the fourth quarter, we're excited to move on to video game design, so stay tuned for that!

New Bremen Media Classes Explore Creativity Through Innovative Projects

The media classes at New Bremen High School continue to push the boundaries of creativity and practical application in graphic design and digital media. Each level of the media curriculum is designed to build on skills and concepts, providing students with an understanding of the media and design in the real-world.

Media I

In Media I, students have just wrapped up a unit on color theory. Throughout this unit, they learned the fundamentals of color relationships and how colors interact with one another. This lesson highlighted the significant role that color plays in marketing and advertising design, teaching students to apply this knowledge in creating visually appealing layouts that communicate effectively. This foundational understanding not only enhances their design skills but also prepares them for more complex projects in subsequent classes.

Media II

Students in Media II have recently completed a fascinating project that involved the double exposure technique using Adobe Photoshop. This is one of my favorite projects every year. Each student blended their profile with a modified landscape image, creating a unique design that tells a personal story through visual layers. This project allowed students to showcase their technical skills along with the ability to convey deeper meanings through digital media.

Media III:

The advanced students in Media III have been diving into the world of fashion and pop art. After designing and sublimating playful patterns on socks, they have shifted their focus to studying Andy Warhol, a pioneer in the pop art movement. Currently, they are learning about his early screen-printing techniques, applying his iconic style to their creations. This project not only teaches them about an important figure in art history but also allows them to explore the connection between art and everyday objects, echoing Warhol's philosophy of art accessible to all.

These projects across the Media classes at New Bremen High School illustrate a creative approach to learning, where students apply theoretical knowledge in practical, hands-on, artistic ways. By exploring various aspects of media and design, students are prepared to enter any professional field with a deep understanding of visual communication.
